What is a Title I school?

- Title I was passed in 1965 under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). It is the largest federal assistance program for our nation's schools.
- Title I schools receive extra funding from the federal government.
 - These dollars are used to:
 - identify students experiencing academic difficulties and to provide assistance in need of help;
 - purchase additional staff, programs, materials, and/or supplies; and
 - conduct parent and family engagement meetings, trainings, events, and/or activities.
 - LEAP is a Title 1 Charter School

What are my rights?

- The families and parents of Title I students have a right, by law, to:
 - be involved in decisions made at both the school and district level;
 - be provided with information on your child's level of achievement on tests in reading/language arts, writing, mathematics, and science;
 - request and receive information on the qualifications of your child's teacher and paraprofessionals who are working with your child and
 - request opportunities for regular meetings to formulate suggestions and to participate, as appropriate, in decisions about the education of your child. The school is required to respond to any such suggestions as soon as practicably possible.

What are Title I funds be used for?

- At LEAP, we utilize Title I funds for:
 - additional teachers and paraprofessionals,
 - basic skills instruction,
 - additional training for school staff,
 - extra time for instruction (before and after school programs, summer enrichment),
 - parent and family engagement activities, and
 - a variety of supplemental instructional materials, equipment, and technology.

How does our school use Title I funds?

- In 2022-2023, our school was allotted \$1,243,500 in Title I funding.
- We developed a Schoolwide Plan, which means we anticipate spending our funds on the following:
 - Supplemental staff:
 - BSI, Paraprofessionals, College Access, ESL, and Math
 - Programs/Materials:
 - Rutgers Tutoring, STEM Summer Enrichment, SAT Prep, Instructional Software, Supplemental Materials
 - Professional Development:
 - New Staff Orientation, News ELA, Schoology, PowerSchool

Title I Summer Learning Academy K-12

LEAP Academy runs Summer Academies for learning accelerations.

Students participate in the following activities:

- Reading acceleration
- Math acceleration
- Hands-on Science
- Art, Mindfulness and Physical Education



STEMscopes Science Curriculum K-12


- •STEMscopes is a complete digital science curriculum available on Schoology

Sonday Essentials is a phonics program to assist students in learning sounds, letters, and word recognition.


Supplemental Intervention

Imagine Learning

ELA and Math K-12

Imagine Math is a selfpaced supplemental intervention with ELA and Math programs that meets students where they are according to NWEA Map testing data.

Students use Imagine learning in class and at home.

Students receive 1 hour of Imagine math work per week



What are our schoolwide program goals for 2022-2023

How is parent and family engagement funded?

 Any district with a Title I allocation exceeding \$500,000 is required by law to set aside 1% of it's Title I allocation for parent and family engagement.

How is parent and family engagement funded?

- In 2022-2023, LEAP received \$12,435 in parent and family engagement funding.
- We plan to use these funds for:

 - Annual Meeting

 - Materials/Supplies
 - Materials and supplies (food and supplies for meetings, and childcare

What is a Parent and Family Engagement Policy?

- These plans address how the district and school will implement the parent and family engagement requirements of ESSA. Components should include:
 - how parents and families can be involved in decision-making and activities;
 - how parent and family engagement funds are being used;
 - how information and training will be provided to families; and
 - how the school will build capacity in families and staff for strong parent and family engagement.
- As a Title I parent or family member, you have the right to be involved in the development of these plans.

What is a School-Parent Compact?

- A school-parent compact is a written commitment that outlines how the entire school community – teachers, families, and students will share the responsibility for improved academic achievement.
- The compact must describe how the school will:
 - provide high-quality curriculum and instruction;
 - hold parent-teacher conferences, annually in elementary schools;
 - provide parents with reports on their child's progress;
 - provide parents reasonable access to staff.
 - provide parents opportunities to volunteer; and
 - ensure regular two-way meaningful communication between family members and staff, to the extent practicable, in a language family members can understand.
- You, as a Title I parent or family member, have the right to be involved in the development of the compact.

What is a School-Parent Compact?
